We have now finished paying a number of research and other grant commitments, this has left our reserves fairly low and we need to rebuild them. 

## First in man Tolerance Study launches at Guy's!

The main problem for transplant patients and their doctors is that the immune system can reject and destroy the transplanted kidney, even after many years.



Doctors and scientists at Guy's have been looking at different ways of controlling the immune system without immune suppressing drugs, a situation called Tolerance. The ONE Study is a new and

most powerful immune suppressing drugs.

ground-breaking research study into a more natural way of suppressing the immune system in kidney transplant patients.

During the study we will take blood from patients who are scheduled to receive a kidney transplant from a living donor. We will separate the white blood cells from the red blood cells and among the white blood cells we can identify and purify a particular type of immune suppressing cell called a regulatory T cell. We will grow these cells in the laboratory and 5 days after the kidney transplant, we will give them back to the patient using a 'drip'. We want to see whether the cells will



survive in the patient and whether they can alter the immune system so that it is less likely to reject the new kidney. If this more natural way of suppressing the immune response is successful this would allow us to use lower doses and fewer immune suppressing drugs so that patients would experience fewer side-effects.

## CARAVAN HOLIDAYS FOR KIDNEY PATIENTS





The Dudley Kidney Patients' Association own three large caravan holiday homes that they let to patients and their families / friends to enable them to have holidays at a very reasonable cost. They are now kindly offering this facility to Guy's and St Thomas' kidney patients.

Up to six people can stay for a week or for short breaks depending on availability. They are all on lovely sites with excellent facilities including swimming pools, bars and entertainment, restaurants, play and sports facilities.

Two of the caravans are close to the seaside and the other is within an area of water parks. They are open from April to the end of October. The caravans can be found at:

- Hoburne Devon Bay site at Goodrington, Devon
- Haven Holiday site at Burnham-on-sea, Somerset

Haemodialysis is available at local hospitals but must be booked well in advance.
Peritoneal dialysis patients can have their fluids delivered to the caravans. Transplant patients and pre-dialysis patients are also welcome to use the caravans.


### Living kidney donation in the African Caribbean Community

I walked through the revolving doors at Guy's Hospital in January 2011 for first day of my living kidney donor assessment. Nothing could have prepared me for the journey ahead; I was nervous and excited about donating one of my kidneys to help my brother Tayo.


I never considered that it might not happen, but sadly after months of tests and tearful moments I was told I couldn' be a donor due to health reasons. I was absolutely heartbroken as by now Tayo had started home dialysis and as I watched him prepare for his overnight sessions I noticed the changes to his once bubbly and outgoing personality and the struggles he was facing. It was during this time I knew I needed to use my experience to promote living kidney donation in the African Caribbean community so people like my brother would have a better chance of having a kidney transplant.

I wrote a book called "More Than a Match"; which narrates a moving account of my family's experience as potential living kidney donors. The book gives people an understanding of the living kidney donor assessment process in a simple and informal style. Due to the tremendous efforts and endorsement of the book by Trevor Cook, the late chair of Guy's & St. Thomas' Kidney Patients' Association, it has been distributed to clinics and dialysis units at Guy's; the Evelina London and Great Ormond Street children's hospitals.

People from my community would often ask me why I would even consider being a living donor! I simply explained my brother needed a kidney and since I could live a normal healthy life with only one kidney it was a 'no-brainer' to give him the other one so he could have a better quality of life. This was a unique opportunity for me to raise awareness on living kidney donation. I chose to use film as its visual form can give people a different perspective and it is a great way to engage people. I co-wrote, self-funded and produced a short independent film called We Are Family.



We Are Family is an inspirational and thought-provoking story about the



Although the film illustrates black family life it is relevant to people from all backgrounds. I believe it's a powerful resource that can encourage more kidney patients to ask their family and friends for support and more importantly it can succeed in encouraging relatives and close friends to talk about a subject that is unfamiliar.

There is clear evidence that quality of life improves following a transplant in comparison to dialysis. I hope by using my experience it will change the way people think about organ donation in the African Caribbean community leading to an increase in the number of transplants for black kidney patients.
